All plants share the same basic parts but the way that they look can look very different from one plant to another. The different parts are:

- Roots
- Stem
- Leaves
- Flowers
- Fruits

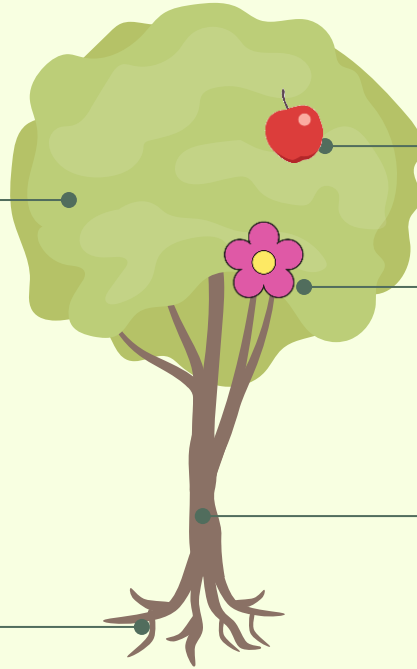

ROOTS

Roots grow into the ground and anchor the plant in place. Just like you and I, plants need water and nutrients to survive. The main job of the roots is to absorb water and nutrients for the plant.

STEM

The stem of a plant gives it structure and helps it grow upward towards the sunlight. The main job of the stem is to carry around water and nutrients from the roots to the rest of the plant.

LEAVES

Leaves are a part of the plant that are used to capture sunlight and create energy for the plant. They are usually flat and green but can appear in a lot of different ways.

FLOWERS

Flowers contain the reproductive structures of plants. They produce seeds, attract pollinators and make sure the plant can reproduce.

Fruits are part of a plant when it flowers. They contain seeds and are very important for plant reproduction.
